RESULTS OF THE RADIOLOGICAL SURVEY AT 170 GREGG STREET, LODI, NEW JERSEY

INTRODUCTION

A radiological survey of 170 Gregg Street, Lodi, New Jersey, was conducted by Oak Ridge National Laboratory (ORNL) on August 21, 1984 at the request of the Department of Energy (DOE). Contaminated material was discovered during mobile gamma scan of Lodi, New Jersey.

The radiological survey conducted on this property was for the purpose of determining whether the property had any radioactive material onsite in excess of background radiation levels, and, if so, were these radioactive materials in excess of remedial action guidelines established by DOE such that the property could be "designated" for further investigation. This report summarizes the results of the "designation" survey performed on this property.

SURVEY METHODS

The radiological survey of the property included: (1) a gamma scan of the entire property outdoors; and (2) sampling of surface (0-15 cm) soil. No indoor survey measurements were performed. These survey methods followed the plan outlined in Reference 2. A comprehensive description of the survey methods and instrumentation have been presented in another report.³

SURVEY RESULTS

Applicable federal guidelines have been summarized in Table 1. The normal background levels for the northern New Jersey area are presented in Table 2. These data are provided for comparison with the survey results presented in this section. All direct measurement results presented in this report are gross readings at ground surface; background radiation levels have not been subtracted. Similarly, background

concentrations have not been subtracted from radionuclide concentrations measured in environmental samples.

Systematic and Biased Soil Samples




Fig. 1. Diagram showing locations of soil samples taken at 170 Gregg Street.

Systematic and biased soil samples were taken from various locations on the property for radionuclide analyses. Locations of the systematic (LJ1S samples) and biased (LJ1B samples) samples are shown in Fig. 1, with results of laboratory analyses provided in Table 3. Concentrations of 232 Th exceeded the background concentrations of 232 Th anticipated for northern New Jersey in the biased soil samples collected at 170 Gregg Street (LJ1B1 and LJ1B2). These results indicate that 232 Th-bearing residues exist on this site. The amount of material present may be in excess of DOE guidelines (Table 1).

Gamma Radiation Levels




Fig. 2. Location of elevated gamma radiation levels at 170 Gregg Street.

Results of the gamma scan of the surface of the property show several areas where gamma exposure rates are in excess of background radiation levels. These locations are shown in Fig. 2, and the measurements are quantified. These locations suggest where potential $^{232}{\rm Th}$ contamination exists. Gamma exposure rate levels up to 110 $\mu R/h$ at the ground surface exist on this property.

SUMMARY

Measurements taken at 170 Gregg Street indicate that the property contains radioactive contamination primarily from the 232 Th decay chain, and to a lesser extent from the 238 U decay chain. This material is found in the locations shown in Fig. 2. Although concentrations of radionuclides were elevated significantly above background, the levels may or may not be in excess of DOE remedial action guidelines. It is recommended that this property be designated for further evaluation. A comprehensive radiological survey will be required to confirm that sufficient contamination exists on site to warrant remedial action.
